Outcomes for 2014/2015

The outcomes of these new partnerships and funding opportunities have created outcomes that have increased the participation of urban Aboriginal people in the economy, prepared youth transitioning out of CFS care for living independently, provided girls with leadership development, and reduced recidivism among boys.

Employment and Training



Information and Office Administrative Assistant Program:

18 students began the IOAA program and 14 graduated from the program. After graduation 9 went on to attain the Computer Applications for Business Diploma at RRC and 7 secured employment through their work practicum.

Honouring Gifts:

22 students began the HG program. 17 of them completed the program and left with a personal action plan. After graduation 9 received employment, 5 went on to mature grade 12 programs, 2 went to post-secondary, 1 went into the trades and one is taking a year off for maternity leave.

Medicine Children's Lodge Daycare:

There were 42 children supported in the daycare while their mother attending an employment and training program, 8 infants and 34 preschool age.

Youth Leadership and Mentorship Programs

Restoring the Sacred:

There were 15 active participants, of whom 11 completed the Restoring the Sacred program and 4 were unable to continue in the program. Of those:

1 was in his final year of school and graduated.

10 completed their grade level and moved into the next grade level.

MYTEAM:

Of those participants enrolled in 2014-2015, 6 obtained employment, 20 returned to school, 3 went into post secondary, 13 attended training programs, and 9 obtained housing.

Butterfly Club:

The Butterfly Club has maintained up to 30 girls in the program throughout 2014-

Transition and Residential Services

At Our Relatives' Place:

At Our Relatives' Place has achieved 80% placement capacity at various times throughout 2014-2015. The program recruits specialized foster care homes and has conducted up to 35 family placement interviews.

Ki Ma Mina:

This transition program has maintained 75% capacity throughout 2014-2015.
